


Homework: Yay or Nay?




Earth's Core Changing

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day


Who was Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.? Dr. Martin Luther King was an African American civil rights activist from Georgia. Dr. Martin Luther King was born on January 15, 1929, and died on April 4, 1968. If he were alive today, he would be 93 years old. He attended Morehouse College at 15 years old. He was arrested 19 times for the color of his skin. In 1963, Martin Luther King Jr. was arrested and sent to jail, because he and others were protesting the treatment of African Americans in Birmingham, Alabama. A court had ordered that King could not hold protests in Birmingham. Birmingham in 1963 was a hard place for African Americans to live in. He was known for his contributions to the American Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s. His most notable work was his "I Have a Dream " speech, delivered in 1963, in which he spoke of his dream of the United States that is void of segregation and racism. King also advocated for nonviolent methods of protest, and he organized and staged countless marches. Why do we celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day? To commemorate the life and work of Dr. King, who was a Baptist minister and prominent leader in the American Civil Rights Movement. People are encouraged to use the day to "reflect on the principles of racial equality and nonviolent social change."
